Missouri University of Science and Technology is an R1, land-grant institution with approximately 7,200 students. The College of Arts, Sciences, and Education (CASE) comprises over 120 full-time faculty—including 19 endowed or named professors—77 staff, 760 students, and nine academic departments. CASE also hosts two ROTC programs, the Child Development Center, and the Ozark Research Field Station. Annually, the college delivers over 65,000 student credit hours and operates with a \$20 million budget.

The School of Public and International Affairs (SPIA), ranked among the top 15% of public policy schools nationwide, comprises four academic and research units: Urban Affairs and Planning (accredited by the Planning Accreditation Board), the Center for Public Administration and Policy (accredited by NASPAA [Network of Schools of Public Policy, Affairs]), Government and International Affairs, and the Institute for Policy and Governance. With 60 faculty members and 400 undergraduate and graduate students (including 123 Ph.D. candidates), SPIA offers over 9,000 student credit hours annually and operates on a \$4.2 million budget.
