Valerie Accetta is the Head of Musical Theatre at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. She is a member of Actor's Equity Association and an Estill Master Trainer. Other performance credits include Cinderella, The Sound of Music, and Once Upon a Mattress, and she performs regularly in concerts and cabarets. She holds a BA in Musical Theatre Pedagogy from Otterbein University and an MFA in Theatre Pedagogy from Virginia Commonwealth University. She was the Head of Drama at Campion School, an international school in Athens, Greece, directing Godspell, which toured to the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. Valerie's directing credits include Oklahoma!, South Pacific, and Pippin at the Weathervane Playhouse.

Julio Agustin is an assistant professor of theatre at the University of Miami. He has performed in six Broadway shows (Chicago, Fosse, Steel Pier) and runs a monthly audition studio in New York City, The Transition Workshop (JulioAgustin.com). His book The Professional Actor's Handbook: From Casting Call to Curtain Call was released in February 2017 and is available through Rowman and Littlefield. Member: AEA, SAG-AFTRA, SDC, VASTA, ATHE.

Stacy Alley is Head of Musical Theatre and an Associate Professor of Musical Theatre/Dance at the University of Alabama. She is a professional director and choreographer whose teaching/artistic credits include work in Denmark, Tanzania, Norway, Scotland, and Chile and in theatres throughout the U.S. She is the Vice-President of the Musical Theatre Educators Alliance, and a member of the Southeastern Theatre Conference and SDC. Stacy received an MFA in Acting from The University of Alabama, a BA in Theatre from the University of Southern California, and is a Certified Movement Analyst through The Laban/Bartenieff Institute of Movement Studies. Stacy was recently awarded the Outstanding Commitment to Teaching Award from the University of Alabama's National Alumni Association.

Elizabeth Ann Benson is recognized as a dynamic and versatile artist and has performed opera at Carnegie Hall, and musical theatre at Chicago's Symphony Center. Her solo cabaret show, Weaving Stories, features

songs drawn from classical art song, musical theatre, and contemporary pop/rock. At Auburn University, she is assistant professor of music theatre singing and serves as music and vocal director for the theatre department. She has published in the Journal of Singing and American Music Teacher and has presented at national conferences for The Voice Foundation, NATS, and APME. Her first book, Training Contemporary Commercial Singers, will be released by Compton Publishing in 2019.

Jay Berkow has served as Director of Music Theatre Performance at Western Michigan University since 2004. He is the co-author and director/choreographer of the Off-Broadway hit JOLSON & CO. published by Samuel French, Inc. His internationally produced musical, WHAT A GLORIOUS FEELING is published by Playscripts, Inc. In collaboration with composer David Ogrin, Jay is developing a musical based on the life of Mata Hari. Jay directed the Off-Broadway revival of THE RINK, as well as, RED HOT MAMA and THE LADY IN PENTHOUSE B. Regional credits include Florida Studio Theatre, Indiana Repertory, Playhouse on the Square, Adirondack Theatre Festival, Gateway Playhouse, Virginia Repertory, Connecticut Repertory, Coconut Grove Playhouse, American Stage, Florida Rep, the Burt Reynolds Theatre, Riverside Theatre, Circa '21, and many others.

Brenda Braxton starred as Velma Kelly opposite Usher in Broadway's hit musical Chicago. Prior to that, she was featured on Broadway in the musical revue Smokey Joe's Cafe, that earned her a 1995 Tony Award nomination, the NAACP Theater Award, the city of Chicago's Jefferson Award and a Grammy Award for Best Cast Album. Other Broadway credits include Jelly's Last Jam, Cats, Legs Diamond and the original production of Dreamgirls. She received the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s Living the Dream Award given by New York Gov. George Pataki and the Josephine Baker Award from the National Council of Negro Women for her work as founder of Leading Ladies Just for Teens, seminars geared to empowering teenage girls. André Garner is currently an Assistant Professor of Acting at Ball State University. As an actor, André has performed on stages all over the world. 
