



Sholeh Wolpe

We are happy to announce that Sholeh Wolpe has joined UCI Jordan Center for Persian Studies and Culture as the Writer-in-Residence, and lecturer in the Department of Comparative Literature at UC Irvine, teaching Translation Studies.

Sholeh Wolpe is an Iranian-born poet, playwright, and literary translator. Her performances, solo or in collaboration with musicians and artists, have been hailed by audiences as mesmerizing. Named a "2020-2021 Cultural Trailblazer" and is the recipient of a 2014 PEN Heim, 2013 Midwest Book Award and 2010 Lois Roth Persian Translation prize. Her plays have been finalists and semifinalists at Bay Area Playwrights Festival, Eugene O'Neill National Playwrights Conference, Centenary Stage Women Playwrights, Ojai Playwrights Festival, and Ashland New Plays Festival. Her play LET ME IN is among Theaterfolks' top ten plays requested by schools.

Sholeh's literary work includes five collections of poetry, several plays, three books of translations, and three anthologies. Her most recent publications include The Conference of the Birds (W.W. Norton & Co), Cómo escribir una canción de amor (Olifante Ediciones de Poesia, Spain),

and Keeping Time with Blue Hyacinths (University of Arkansas Press.) Her new collection of poems, Abacus of Loss, is forthcoming from the University of Arkansas Press in March 2022.

Sholeh has performed her literary work with world-renowned musicians at Quincy Jones Presents series on The Broad Stage, Skirball Cultural Center Series, Los Angeles Aloud, The Broad Museum, LA County Museum of Art Ahmanson stage, Singapore Literature Festival, UNSW School of Arts and Media theater, and other venues. Her new oratorio with composer Fahad Siadat and choreographer Andre Megerdichian, The Conference of the Birds, will premiere in Los Angeles in 2022. We then hope to have this performance at UC Irvine.

Sholeh travels internationally as a performing poet, writer, and public speaker. She has also taught at UCLA— where she was the inaugural Writer-in-Residence in 2018— as well as University of Maine's Stonecoast MFA program in the United States. She has lived in Iran, Trinidad, and the UK, and presently lives in Los Angeles with her husband, sociologist Edward Telles.

Sholeh Wolpe's presence on campus will significantly add to the field of Contemporary Iranian Studies, as well as in the field of Comparative Literature, Translation Studies and theater at UC Irvine.







Payravi Conference on Ancient Iranian History III








Online Screening of "COUP 53" by Taghi Amirani

The online screening of the documentary movie titled "COUP 53" directed by Taghi Amirani plus a Q&A with Ralph Fiennes, Walter Murch and the Director on Wednesday, August 19, 2020.


A While making a documentary about the CIA/MI6 coup in Iran in 1953, Iranian director Taghi Amirani and editor Walter Murch (Apocalypse Now, The Conversation, The English Patient) discover never seen before archive material hidden for decades. The 16mm footage and documents not only allow the filmmakers to tell the story of the overthrow of the Iranian government in unprecedented detail, but it also leads to explosive revelations about dark secrets buried for 67 years. Working with Ralph Fiennes (The Grand Budapest Hotel, Schindler's List, The English Patient) to help bring the lost material to life, what began as a historical documentary about four days in August 1953 turned into a live investigation, taking the filmmakers into uncharted cinematic waters. The roots of Iran's volatile relationship with America and Britain has never been so forensically and dramatically exposed.

Online Screening of "NASRIN" by Jeff Kaufman




The online screening of the documentary movie titled "NASRIN" directed by Jeff Kaufmanon and Live Q&A with the film-making team on Tuesday, October 13, 2020.

NASRIN is an immersive portrait of attorney Nasrin Sotoudeh, one of the world's most prominent human rights activists and political prisoners. Nasrin has long fought for the rights of women, children, LGBT prisoners, religious and ethnic minorities, journalists, and artists, and those facing the death penalty. She was arrested in June 2018 for representing women who were protesting Iran's mandatory hijab law, and she was sentenced to 38 years in prison, plus 148 lashes (12 years of which she must serve). From prison, she has continued to challenge the authorities. An Amnesty International petition calling for her release received over a million signatures from 200 countries. She has received several international human rights awards, the latest being The Right Livelihood Award, known as the "Alternative Nobel Prize," which has been honoring courageous changemakers for the past forty years. Written and directed by Jeff Kaufman, produced by Marcia Ross, and secretly filmed in Iran by women and men who risked arrest to make it, the film also tells the story of Iran's remarkably resilient women's rights movement.

In Memoriam: Ostad Mohammad Reza Shajarian




A virtual ceremony was held in memory of Maestro Mohammad Reza Shajarian on Sunday, October 18, 2020 via Zoom.

Mohammad-Reza Shajarian was an Iranian singer and master of Persian traditional music. He was also known for his skills in Persian calligraphy and humanitarian activities. Shajarian started his singing career in 1959 at Radio Khorasan, rising to prominence in the 1960s with his distinct style of singing.




UCI Jordan Center's 2019 Yalda Night Celebration

Virtual 2021 Nowrooz Spring Festival







































Massiah Foundation Gift for UCI Chair in Zoroastrian Studies





The University of California, Irvine has received a \$1.5 million challenge commitment from the Massiah Foundation to establish the Ferdowsi Presidential Chair in Zoroastrian Studies – the first of its kind in the United States. Additionally, the University of California will support the chair with up to \$500,000.

The Massiah Foundation was founded by Fariborz Maseeh, Ph.D., an Iranian American businessman and pioneer in the field of microelectromechanical systems who lives in Newport Beach. Maseeh has a history of making philanthropic investments in education, the arts and health-related causes through the organization. In 2005, the Massiah Foundation funded the creation of UCI's Samuel Jordan Center for Persian Studies and Culture, the first independent, interdisciplinary center focused on Iran within the UC system. The new Ferdowsi Presidential Chair in Zoroastrian Studies will be affiliated with the Jordan Center. "We are incredibly grateful to Dr. Maseeh for establishing this new chair to expand research into Zoroastrian studies," said UCI history professor Touraj Daryaee, the Maseeh Chair in Persian Studies and Culture and director of the Jordan Center. "The chair will enhance the already rich global historical and cultural study that takes place in the center, further raising its distinction not just at UCI but throughout the world."

The new chair is named in honor of Ferdowsi, the 10th-century Persian poet who is often credited with saving the Persian language by writing Shahnameh (Book of Kings), the national epic of Greater Iran. Maseeh hopes the chair will challenge and inspire the diasporic Parsi community – the ethnoreligious group of followers of Zoroastrianism who immigrated to the Indian subcontinent during and after the Muslim conquest of Persia – to help him revive an ancient Persian philosophy. "By broadening UCI's Persian studies program to include Zoroastrianism, we encourage young people to enrich their multicultural awareness – an essential component of working and living in a modern, multiethnic society," Maseeh said.

The Jordan Center is both UCI's dedicated hub for Persian studies and a global destination for Persian scholars. Since its inception, the center has hosted international conferences on the Iranian world and created clusters uniting researchers from a multitude of disciplines across campus. UCI students can minor in Persian studies and take courses about ancient and modern Iran; graduate students can pursue a specialization in ancient Iran and the premodern Persianate world. The Ferdowsi Chair will be UCI's fifth endowed chair in Persian studies – more than any other university in the United States.

The holder of the chair – which will be supported by the Department of Classics and the Program in Religious Studies – will be a recognized expert in Zoroastrianism, one of the world's oldest continuously practiced religions.

Roshan Endowment for Doctoral Fellowships in Iranian Studies







The University of California, Irvine has received a \$1,565,000 grant from Roshan Cultural Heritage Institute, with \$1.5 million establishing an endowment for doctoral students pursuing Iranian studies at UCI. The remaining \$65,000 of the grant will immediately fund graduate student fellowships. Roshan Cultural Heritage Institute has supported several Iranian-focused initiatives at UCI, and this new grant – which comes from the Roshan Cultural Heritage Institute Fund, a donor-advised fund of Silicon Valley Community Foundation – marks its second campus endowment. The \$2 million Elahé Omidyar Mir-Djalali Presidential Chair in Art History & Archaeology of Ancient Iran, currently held by Matthew Canepa, a professor in UCI's Department of Art History, was created in 2017.


